
Dialogues because she has been commissioned by the HSO to compose a new piece for the upcoming "I Have A Dream" concert in January.

the opportunity to interact with the audience in a way that we normally can't."



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

Lyric soprano Ingrid Mankhof is a graduate of McGill University in Montreal. She participated in the apprenticeship program at L'Opera de Montreal during which she sang roles such as Musetta in *La Boheme*, Pamina in *Die Zauberflöte*, Liu in *Turandot*, and as soloist in Orff's *Carmina Burana*. In her European stage debut, Ms. Mankhof performed to acclaim in the title role of Kalman's *The Gypsy Princess* in Klagenfurt, Austria. Throughout Europe, she has sung many leading lady roles in the operetta genre including Lisa in *Land of Smiles*, Mrs. Ford in *The Merry Wives of Windsor* and the title role in Offenbach's *La Belle Helene*. She triumphed at the Frankfurt Alte Oper in Strauss' *Vienna Blood*, where she was described as "brilliant" and also garnered rave reviews as a sparkling and mesmerizing widow in *The Merry Widow*.
